#### **AFGHANISTAN: WAR AND POETRY**



#### **INTERFERENCE: READINGS** FROM CZECH WRITING

performed by Okna Okna (meaning 'windows') is a company set up last year to promote Czechoslovakian writing in this country. The presentation features actors and a musician performing a selection of readings from authors such as novelist Milan Kundera, Franz Kafka, Vaclav Havel, Jaroslav Hasek and poet Miroslav

Holub. The performance will be accompanied by a small exhibition of photographs by Ivan Kyncl, a member of the dissident Charter 77 movement. His photographs, often taken in situations of personal danger - from underneath a jacket, through the windscreen of a moving car, through prison windows - form an irrefutable indictment of power and secrecy.


# THE STORY OF POLITICAL POP MUSIC an illustrated talk by Robin Denselow




Mervyn Peake's portrait of Sebastian Peake as a child.


