

Welcome to the 2001 Kent Literature Festival; a week-long feast of readings, performances, talks, screenings, book launches, debates, signings and special events, celebrating the enormously rich literary and cultural heritage of East Kent.

The Festival highlights the area's connections with world famous authors: Charles Dickens through a unique lecture on Dickens and Pavilionstone (as he called Folkestone); HG Wells – through a screening of the film of War of the Worlds in a unique historic building near the home he built in Sandgate, and a debate on the legacy of his Utopianism; and **Agatha Christie** – through the Orient Express Ball at the Grand Hotel, with a prize of a trip to Venice on the Orient Express, generously sponsored by Venice Simplon-Orient-Express Ltd. East Kent's strong links with Bletchley Park are explored through two events, one of which takes place on the Russian Submarine in Folkestone Harbour and the other of which includes a demonstration of a working Enigma Machine.

In more recent years, the area has been home to **Oliver Postgate**, **Anhua Gao**, (both of whom make appearances), and to the late **Derek Jarman**, whose paintings inspired by Dungeness and Romney Marsh feature in a concurrent exhibition at The Metropole Galleries.

During the Festival, Resident Poet **John Hegley** explores the district, leaving behind his musings, jottings and drawings as he goes. To round off his residency, there's a free concert by his band The **Popticians** in the superb setting of Folkestone's open air amphitheatre (assuming Folkestone's famous sunshine doesn't let us down).

The Festival is a partnership of some of the main cultural organisations in East Kent: The Metropole Galleries, Waterstones Bookshop, Folkestone Library, G & D Marrin & Sons, Ottakars Bookshop, The Grand Hotel Folkestone, Kent Film, South Kent College, Kent Hothouse and Kent Institute of Art and Design. Many of the events are free – all are excellent value. Places are limited, so please book early to avoid disappointment.


