#### FACT INTO FICTION - THE WRITING OF 'THE KILLING FIELDS'

A talk by Christopher Hudson who wrote the book of the Academy Award winning film.

Earlier this year The Killing Fields produced by David Puttnam won three Oscars. This event will examine the ways in which the known facts of the lives of Sydney Schanberg and Dith Pran are turned into a highly successful book and film.

The presentation will incorporate the showing of scenes from the film which was rated '15'.

Christopher Hudson was educated at King's School, Canterbury and Cambridge. He was commissioning editor at Faber & Faber for two years, working on poetry and drama. In 1971 he became Literary Editor of the Spectator, also writing a film column.

In 1973 he turned freelance, writing with the director Stuart Cooper the screenplay for Overlord, a film about the D-Day landings which won a Silver Bear Award at the 1975 Berlin Film Festival and the Evening News Special Award in 1976.

For the next two years, under a Harkness Fellowship, Christopher Hudson travelled throughout the USA and studied under Saul Bellow at the University of Chicago. His research thesis was on ideas of Paradise in Western civilization, and his completed study will be published by Constable. On his return to the UK in 1977 he wrote editorials and reviews for the London Standard for which he now edits the Books Pages. His novel **The Final Act** was published in 1980 by Michael Joseph. In 1982 his second novel Insider Out was published and acclaimed by Ted Allbeury as "a first-class spy thriller belonging in the top league'

Neil Innes first came to prominence with the sixties comedy group 'The Bonzo Dog Doo Dah Band' writing classic songs such as 'I'm the Urban Spaceman'. In the late sixties he teamed up with Roger McGough and the Scaffold group to form the touring band of poets and songsters Grimms.

In the seventies Neil worked with ex-Monty Python member Eric Idle on the BBC series 'Rutland Weekend Television' which led, in turn, to 'The Rutles!' – a marvellously skilful 50 minute television spoof on the life and times of The Beatles.

In the eighties Neil continues to produce some of the most remarkable parodies and musical inventions in his regular BBC television programme The Innes Book of Records.


Peter Porter was born in Brisbane, Australia in 1929, but has lived in England since 1951. After a variety of commercial jobs, including bookselling and advertising writing, he became a full-time writer in 1968. He is chiefly a poet and has published more than a dozen original volumes, including his Collected Poems (Oxford University Press, 1983). 

#### THE DEFENCE DIARIES OF W. MORGAN PETTY

Brian Bethell reads from the hilarious diaries of one Mr. W. Morgan Petty, who in February 1983 declared his house and surrounding garden at 3 Cherry Drive, Canterbury a nuclear free zone and took over responsibility for his own defence. His diaries detail a year of hectic correspondence with heads of state, chiefs of armed forces, ministries, atomic research centres and manufacturers of jet fighters, missiles, etc. etc. The replies to some of Mr. Morgan Petty's most searching enquiries are both surprising and delightful.



Brian Bethell, who edited the diaries, has been, in turn, a printing apprentice, a civil servant, a law student and a radio and TV scriptwriter. He lives in Canterbury with his wife and family and his hobbies include breeding exotic fish, watching other people do strenuous things and translating government forms!







#### WRITING ROMANTIC & HISTORICAL FICTION

- Tutor Rhona Martin

This informal all-day workshop will include discussion of the special problems of the historical novelist and of students' own particular difficulties. As it will also involve practical work, students should come equipped with writing materials and sufficient research on their chosen period to enable the scene to be set. The aim of the workshop will be to help each participant to take his or her work a stage further.

Rhona Martin's first novel, Gallows Wedding won the Georgette Heyer Historical Novel Prize in 1978. In 1981 she published Mango Walk which was a modern love story set against a background of racial tension. Last year she went back into history to write The Unicorn Summer which has been described as a "haunting, violent, tender and bloody picture of Tudor England". She is a committee member of the Romantic Novelists Association and is an experienced tutor of creative writing. Rhona Martin's books are available in hardback by Bodley Head and in paperback by Corgi.

#### LOVING HISTORY

Susan Kay lives in Cheshire and has already won two major awards for her first book Legacy (Bodley Head), a powerful novel of Elizabeth I and her times. The book is one of the best selling romantic novels of recent years.

Last year Alam Fisher of Hastings won the Georgette Heyer Memorial Prize for his novel The Terioki Crossing (Bodley Head/Corgi) set in Russia earlier this century. The book was also short-listed for the South East Arts Book Award.

Rhona Martin is a Kent author who won the Georgette Heyer Memorial Prize in 1978 for her first book Gallows Wedding (Bodley Head/Corgi) (for full biography, see Event 23).

Teachers' Workshop with children's novelist

#### Jan Mark

Jan Mark's work in schools and colleges, particularly during the last three years, has led her to question very seriously the validity of attempting to teach Creative Writing – something which she refuses to do – and to ponder the fact that Creative Writing may well be a misnomer for the work which children produce.

With these doubts in mind, she will begin the day by discussing the nature of children's writing, their approaches and source material and the disadvantages under which they and their teachers labour. This will be followed by a workshop in which participants might explore the possible results of using oral and visual stimuli as alternatives to written sources, with the understanding that course members should themselves be prepared to write, and that the day will end with readings of work produced during the workshop.





#### Writer in Residence



This year the poet Pie Corbett is the Kent Literature Festival's first Writer in Residence. The post is financed by South East Arts and the writer's role is to stimulate an interest in reading and writing throughout East Kent so that people living in that area can have a personal introduction to what the Kent Literature Festival stands for. The writer will be available at certain times during the Festival to give practical advice to anyone who writes or is involved in encouraging young people to write and read more.

Based at the Arts Centre at Folkestone, Pie Corbett will be in residence during September and October and his visits will take him to schools, teachers' centres, libraries, adult education centres, day centres and any other location in the East Kent area where he can meet the public. He will also be prepared to run workshops, give talks or presentations at youth clubs, children's book groups or literary societies and to other interest groups such as PTAs or family book groups, EFL colleges or women's groups.

In August 1985 Pie Corbett and his colleague Brian Moses published their book Catapults and Kingfishers (Oxford University Press) which is concerned with teaching poetry in the primary school (in fact themes from the book can also be adapted for many other applications in the craft of poetry writing). Pie has been a regular participant in the various Writers in Schools schemes and has a particularly strong reputation amongst educationalists. An accomplished poet himself, he will bring his wide experience and his tremendous enthusiasm to many people during his Festival residency.
