This year's Festival, the ninth, brings two major new developments that will serve to enhance the standing, and further the reputation, of the Kent Literature Festival. The first is the inauguration of our first Open Poetry Competition which was

launched in the spring and gathered momentum throughout the early summer. Thousands of entries were received from all over the U.K. and I express my warmest congratulations to our adjudicator, Liz Lochhead, for finding such deserving winners. The results will be kept secret until the special Poetry Competition Award Ceremony on Festival Sunday (30th October, 12 noon, see Event 22). I also express my gratitude to David Shields who, in a voluntary capacity, organised and monitored the Competition on behalf of the Festival.

The second new concept for 1988 is the participation of other venues in the Festival. Libraries and Arts Centres in Tunbridge Wells, Ashford, Gravesend, Medway and Maidstone are taking part for the first time this year by hosting Festival events which will appeal to each community. South East Arts was the motivating force behind this expansion and the Festival Management Team wishes to thank South East Arts, Kent County Council, Kent County Library and the participating venues for helping to ensure that the Festival becomes more accessible to more people in other areas of this large county. I am convinced these "outreach" events will become an established part of the Festival in future years and that other arts providers will join us in presenting writers and their work to the reading public.

It is positive expansion and development of this nature, and a demonstration of an adventurous artistic spirit as displayed in the 'Accent on Scotland' day (Festival Saturday), that has brought us an increase in sponsorship from W.H. Smith & Son Ltd., a company which has supported the Festival since it began, and further sponsorship from the Royal Bank of Scotland. Colin Thubron, winner of the 1988 Thomas Cook Award talks about his travel books.

Colin Thubron, a descendent of John Dryden, was born in 1939 and worked in publishing before leaving to travel, mainly in Asia and North Africa, making documentary films.

His five books on the Middle East earned him election to the Royal Society of Literature and he is also the author of three highly praised novels including A Cruel Madness (Penguin) which won the 1985 Silver Pen Award. His travel books include Journey Into Cyprus and Among The Russians (both published by Penguin). His book Behind the Wall (Heinemann), is an account of a journey through China ranging from the Burmese frontier to the Gobi Desert, from the Yellow Sea to the edge of Tibet. Earlier this year it won the coveted Thomas Cook Travel and Guide Book Award organised by the



Book Trust.

Writers' Workshop -WRITING AND PUBLISHING YOUR POETRY

A 2-day workshop tutored by Peter Finch, author of the handbook 'How to Publish Your Poetry'

Peter Finch is a poet and short-story writer. he began his literary career as a self-publisher graduating to the editorship of second aeon, the influential small magazine he ran in the early seventies. He currently manages Oriel, the Welsh Arts Council's bookshop in Cardiff. Peter Finch is the author of a number of books including the highly successful **How to Publish Your Poetry** (Alison and Busby). His **Selected Poems** were published by Poetry Wales Press last year. He is a member of The Welsh Academy, treasurer of the Association of Little Presses, and a former council member of the Poetry Society. He lectures on the writing of poetry and short stories as well as on getting into print.

Introductory session - Bring a poem to read - Try your hand at criticism - Warm-up writing -Poems from nothing: an introduction to found material -What to do when inspiration doesn't work - Class work/writing exercises.

THE COMMONWEALTH POETRY PRIZE: ITS HISTORY AND IMPORTANCE

David Dabydeen, winner of the Commonwealth Poetry Prize in 1984, and Alastair Niven. Liz was born in Motherwell in 1948 and now lives in Glasgow. Her bestselling collection of poems Memo for Spring (1972) introduced her to the poetry reading circuit and since then she has performed regularly all over the UK and, occasionally, abroad.

Since 1978 she has been writing more and more for the theatre, radio and television, revue, monologues etc., and since 1981 she has written 13 full length plays including a translation of Molière's 'Tartuffe' into rhyming Scots. Her 1987 'Fringe First' prizewinning play 'Mary Queen of Scots Got Her Head Chopped Off' was revived at Edinburgh's Royal Lyceum Theatre in the spring of 1988 and she is currently the Thames Television Bursary Playwright at the Royal Shakespeare Company.

Her published books are Dreaming Frankenstein and Collected Poems and True Confessions and New Clichés (both Polygon Books, Edinburghl.

Her Playscripts Mary Queen of Scots Got Her Head Chopped Off and Other Plays is published by Penguin.

This will be a workshop which covers the "do's and don'ts, the nuts and bolts" of writing and the sort of topics covered will be how to turn general ideas into particular pieces of writing; creating dramatic tension in writing; writing for a specific medium and many other useful topics for writers taking their first steps.


ANTHONY MASTERS


